Introduction

Henri T. de Hahn, architecture professor at the School of Architecture + Design (A+D), proposes a field trip to Lexington, Kentucky to visit the site of the studio's spring 2017 project 1 -urban loft: a way of living. Not a large city, Lexington is nonetheless impressive for its scale, and deserves closer *in situ* scrutiny. The expenses for each student for a three-day field trip, inclusive of transportation, 2 nights at a hotel and daily per diem is \$200 or less. This budget is proposed in keeping with a goal of maintaining expenses under \$500, thus we are in excellent shape!

Program description:

The trip is an opportunity to see firsthand how issues of historic preservation have an influence on architecture and interior design thinking. The scheduled site visits are little marvels in their own right and reflect individual and group efforts to create a quality space and place for the inhabitants and users (please refer to schedule).

Program Learning Objectives

At the completion of the three-day field trip, students should be able to provide evidential documentation that demonstrate strong learning outcomes in:

- **Knowledge** about the *values* of historic preservation issues (renovation, restoration, rehabilitation and adaptive use) within a contemporary architectural and urban fabric
- **Skills** (oral, visual and written) that document those experiences and *attitudes* towards the creation of spaces and places
- **Competencies** to incorporate these new proficiencies into creative *behavioral* patterns that will allow them to hone their skills directly in the studio context and as future life long designers.

Program Schedule: Thursday, February 2nd – Saturday February 4th, 2017

The program begins after noon (exact time of departure TBD). The faculty member will be the faculty of record and the sole instructor during the field trip program (travel included). Guest speakers will join at key moments per below schedule:
